

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Emergency Relief for Noella

Justice Rising

On May 22nd, Mount Nyiragongo, an active volcano in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, erupted and left hundreds of thousands of people displaced. Our partner, Justice Rising, had two schools destroyed in the eruption. Thankfully, no teachers, staff, or students were injured.

One student, Noella, reflects on this day: "Because things were still unstable, we left again with some of our family members and went into town, but the living conditions were very difficult. Eventually, we had to go to a refugee camp. I cried a lot when I found out my house was destroyed. And then I saw that the volcano also burned my school and I felt really bad," Noella and her family lost everything.

ODW partnered with Justice Rising to provide emergency relief for families still struggling after resettling from the displacement caused by the volcano. We supported a project to provide basic materials to rebuild homes for 600 people, uniforms and school supplies for 335 students, food for 1,434 people, and water and sanitation access for 1,503 people.

Through this partnership, Justice Rising was able to distribute materials to Noella and her family so they could rebuild their home. Thanks to the generosity of One Day's Wages' emergency relief matching grant, Justice Rising was able to help families like Noella's get back on their feet and take large strides in rebuilding after the eruption.

Awash Reunified with His Mother

Next Generation Nepal

Awash is the youngest son of a family from the remote mountainous region of Mugu in Western Nepal where there is extreme poverty, few opportunities for employment, and little chance of receiving an adequate education. A relative told them about a school in Kathmandu where it would be possible for Awash to get an education. Upon arriving after a long journey on foot, he found out he was not staying at a boarding school at all but in an orphanage. Awash stayed with 10 other children in the orphanage where they were beaten by the owner and were forced to beg for food.

Eventually, the Nepal government asked our partner, Next Generation Nepal, to intervene and the children were rescued. Awash's mother decided to move to the capital to reunite with her son and look for a school for him that the family could afford. Now, Awash is doing very well in school and is happy to be back with his mother!

ODW partnered with NGN to rescue and reintegrate 34 children, like Awash, who have been trafficked to illegal and abusive orphanages. All rescued children receive emergency care, general health care, trauma therapy, and education until they can be sustainably and safely reunified with their families.





Computer Lab Vocational Training

Cherish Uganda

One Day's Wages partnered with Cherish Uganda to support the Computer Lab component of their "Educate to Employ" project in the Garuga peninsula of Entebbe, Uganda. This community was strategically chosen because of the high rates of poverty and HIV. The average person in the local village makes an estimated \$1-\$2 USD per day. In the computer lab, students in the program could make up to \$3 USD per hour once their coding work is hired out.

"Now I have a big opportunity!" remarked one of the students of the computer program in Uganda. This project helps students and adults find employment and make a liveable wage by getting hands-on experience.

Our partnership works to renovate an existing classroom to accommodate more students and purchase an additional 22 computers. This project also helps to pay for lab upkeep, salaries, and classroom costs to enroll approximately 40 students over the course of 12 months. This project teaches skills to empower students and adults for employment, breaking the cycle of generational poverty.




